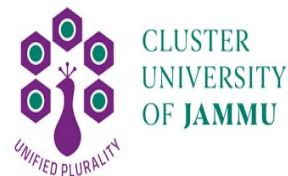
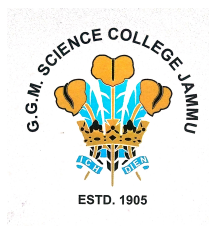

COLLEGE PROFILE

Govt. Gandhi Memorial Science College, Jammu, erstwhile Prince of Wales College, is a fusion of antiquity and contemporaneity.

The college is a constituent College of Cluster University of Jammu, Jammu since 2017 with its aura of history and heritage dates back to 1905, when His Highness, Maharaja Sir Pratap Singh announced the opening of the college as Prince of Wales College. This was to commemorate the visit of His Royal Highness, Prince of Wales, the future King George V. Maharaja Pratap Singh, a benevolent ruler and a great visionary of his times, thus, created the only institution of higher learning in the entire Jammu region.

Prince of Wales College actually started functioning from 20th April 1907 in the then Ajaibghar. It had 26 students on its roll and Prof. R.N. Mukherjee officiated as the Principal of the college.

The college was shifted to the present campus on 18th September 1912 with Prof. S. Robson as the Principal. The founders of the college were undoubtedly men of great acumen and vision. The infrastructure planned a hundred years ago, continues substantially to meet the ever increasing needs of this institution even now. The college hostel that started functioning in July 1910, nearly two years before the college was shifted to the present campus, bears an ample testimony to the farsightedness of the founders. Initially a stream of subjects namely English, Mathematics, Chemistry, History, Persian, Sanskrit and Philosophy were taught up to the intermediate state. In January 1910, two more subjects namely Geology and Arabic were introduced and gradually most of the courses were upgraded to graduation level. During this period, the college excelled academically and its infrastructure was amongst the best in the whole of Northern India. The doyen of Indian Geology Dr. D. N. Wadia established the Department of Geology of the college. Its departmental museum, with its rich and rare collection, continues to be one of the best museums of Geology in the whole of Northern India. In the recent years with the introduction of subjects like Electronics, Computer Applications, Functional English, BCA and Postgraduate courses, the college has once again started admitting female students.

The College was renamed as Govt. Gandhi Memorial College on 20th May 1948. In the subsequent years, Arts and Science streams were separated and in the Year 1954, two colleges namely Govt. Gandhi Memorial Science College and Govt. Maulana Azad Memorial Arts College came into existence. After independence, the college was affiliated to the then J&K University and subsequently to the University of Jammu in 1969, which came into existence under the University Act-XXIV. The College is recognized by UGC under Section 2b & 12f of UGC Act-1956. Since its inception, the College has been epitome of academic excellence, adhering to the ever-changing aspiration and the needs of the student community. The College strongly believes in blending tradition and modernity in order to instill age-old values amongst the students and yet remain relevant to the 21st century academic scenario by transforming and modernizing its academic and extra curricular schedule. To meet the growing challenges of the fast changing global scenario, our faculty is actively involved in research and extension activities. The college has been designated as a 'Hub' for Research in Physical Sciences, Computer applications & IT and 'Spoke' College for research in Life-sciences by the Govt. Higher Education Department, J&K in the year 2020-21. Till date the faculty members of the staff of the college have published numerous research papers in Journals of National and International repute. Teaching faculty is also regularly deputed to attend refresher courses/orientation courses, summer school and national/ international seminars, conferences and workshops.

DOCUMENTS REQUIRED FOR ADMISSION IN 1ST SEMESTER (SESSION 2025-26)

Student has to Download and take printout of the Application/CUET-Allotment form from their Login on <https://jkadmission.samarth.ac.in/index.php/site/login>.

Documents required to be attached along with the admission/ CUET-Allotment form are:

1. Two Passport size Photographs
2. One self-attested photocopy each of 10th and 12th marks sheet certificate.
3. One self-attested Photocopy of CUET marks card.
4. Self attested photo Copy of Category Certificate, if applicable SC/ST/OSC/EWS/RBAPSP (Competent authority for issuing of Certificate is Revenue Officer not below the rank of Tehsildar).
5. Self attested photo Copy of achievement Certificates NSS-BSG/NCC/SPORTS/ECA (if any), if applicable
6. Proof of father's occupation in case of Not a Domicile of J&K (for Central Govt. Employee/PSU)
7. Copy of Defense Personnel Certificate, if applicable (Competent authority for issuing of Certificate is authorized Officer of Zila Sainik Board/Commanding Officer of the Unit where serving or served)
8. Single Girl Category certificate if applicable (Ration Card on account of proof for having single girl child, First Class Magistrate Affidavit)
9. Kashmiri Migrant Category certificate if applicable(Certificate from the Relief Commissioner).
10. Self attested photo Copy Physical Challenged Category Certificate Candidates suffering a degree of disability of 40% and above and visually impaired candidates are eligible for admission under the Person with Disabilities (PwBD) category. Certificate of an orthopedically handicapped or visually impaired shall be considered only if it is issued by the Head of the Department of Orthopedics or that of Ophthalmology of a Government Medical College/District Hospital.
11. Character/Conduct Certificate (original and one self attested photocopy). Character certificate should not be more than six months older. In case of students who had gap in academic career they can get the character certificate from SHO/Sarpanch/1st class Magistrate or any Gazetted officer.
12. One self-attested Photo Copy of Domicile/State Subject, if applicable.
13. Provisional Certificate in original along with one photocopy (For J&K Board).
14. Undertaking, for students having gap in academic career.
15. However, the students who have passed their qualifying examination from the Institution other than the J&K State Board of School Education shall have to submit the following Documents in addition to the above.
 - Migration certificate in original from the University/Board from which the student has passed the qualifying examination.
 - Eligibility certificate.

Note:

- *Candidates are required to bring all original documents for verification at the time of admission*
- *No "Under Process Certificate" shall be entertained under any circumstances for Admission under any Category.*
- *A Candidate, seeking Admission under any Achievement Category (i.e., Sports, Cultural & Literary Activities, NCC, NSS, and Bharat Scouts and Guides, achievement certificates received during the period of qualifying examination (LAST TWO YEARS will be considered)*
- *The ADMISSION FORM completed in all respects along with necessary required documents shall be scrutinized by the members of Admission Committee prior to deposit of fee.*

EVALUATION SCHEME

The Continuous Internal Assessment (Minor) and End Semester Examination (Major) will form the basis for evaluating/ grading the student performance in each paper/ course. A candidate shall have to appear for one written MINOR TEST examination (Internal assessment) and End of the semester exam (MAJOR TEST). All theory subjects in UG (General) shall carry a Continuous Internal Assessment (Minor Test) component to the extent of 20 marks for a 4 Credit Course and 15 marks for a 3 Credit Course and will be of one hour duration. The End of the Semester exam shall carry 80 marks for 4 credit courses and 60 marks for 3 credit courses. The MINOR TEST will be from 20% of the syllabus which is first unit of the syllabus . In the lab component 1 Credit = 25 marks .

MINIMUM ELIGIBILITY FOR APPEARANCE IN EXAMINATION

Students are required to attend at least 75% of the classes actually held, seminars, sessional and practical in each course of study as may be prescribed. No student who has less than 75% attendance in any course shall be permitted to appear in the end- semester examination. A student who fails to secure 40% marks in Minor Test shall not be allowed to sit in the End Term Examination.

ATTENDANCE IN LIEU OF PARTICIPATION IN GAMES ETC.

Any candidate who participates in games, cultural and other co-curricular activities as defined below with the prior approval of the Principal/Director concerned, shall for the purpose of condoning deficiency in attendance incurred by him/her on account of such participation, be treated as present on all the working days during the days of his/her absence on such account for a period of 15 working days in a semester program subject to maximum of 30 working days in a year.

- (a) State representation in International/All India Competitions organized by agencies which are recognized by the Board of Sports and Youth Welfare.
- (b) Participation in the Inter-University Competitions held under the auspices of a University or any other recognized Institution as a member of the University team.
- (c) Participation in the Inter-College Competitions organized by the University as a member of the team of participating Institutions.
- (d) Participation in the N.C.C., N.S.S. and National Integration Samiti activities as a member of recognized Institutions.
- (e) Participation in the Coaching Camps/Rehearsals prior to participation as a member of State or University team in the National/All India/ Inter- University Competitions.
- (f) Participation in the Mountaineering/Hiking/Trekking/Skiing/Rock-Climbing or other such activities organized under the auspices of the State Government/University as a member of the Institution affiliated/recognized by the University.

Note: For Outstanding cases (requiring attendance waiver due to duty beyond 15 days) special permission may be sought from the Vice Chancellor/Competent Authority on recommendation of the Principal/Director Concerned.

PROMOTION TO NEXT SEMESTER

- (i) A student will be eligible for promotion from semester-II to semester-III provided he/she is not falling under shortage and has passed in Internal assessments of all papers of semester-I and II
- (ii) A student will be eligible for promotion from semester-IV to semester-V provided he/she has secured 50% of the total credits of semester-I, II and III, no shortage in Sem IV as well as has passed in Internal assessments of all papers of semester-IV.
- (iii) Only those candidates who have successfully completed all semesters with aggregate 75% marks and above shall be allowed to continue fourth year of the undergraduate program to obtain the bachelor's degree (honors with research).

GENERAL RULES

- No outsider is allowed to enter the College without a valid reason.
- All students have to be in specified uniform as shown below:
 - Boys (UG):** White Shirt-Black formal Trousers in Summers & Black formal Coat or V-neck sweater in Winters.
 - Girls (UG):** Simple White Salwar- Kameez & White Chunni with Black Sweater in Winters (without any designs & hood) or formal Black Coat-Trousers with white shirt.
 - Boys/ Girls (PG):** The dress code for PG students shall be communicated later on.

Note: However, Principal of the College may exempt white Kameez –Salwar & chunni & allow Pink Kameez – Salwar & Chunni instead to a girl student who is married or engaged for marriage on the written request of the Parent/s or Guardians. Denims are not allowed at all. All the students will carry I-Cards every day.

- If a student remains absent from the College for more than fourteen consecutive days, his/her name shall be struck off the College rolls.
- Use of Mobile in the class room is strictly prohibited.
- Unlawful assembly of students is banned.
- Writing of graffiti or sticking of posters and spitting on walls is a cognizable offence.

- **Ragging in any form on or off the college campus including the hostel is a cognizable offence and the student/students involved in ragging will be severely punished as provided in IPC and Hon'ble Supreme Court directions.**
- Disciplinary action will be initiated against a student resorting to unfair means in the Internal Examination.
- A student desirous of withdrawing his/her name from the College rolls should submit an application, countersigned by his parents/guardians. The relevant certificate shall be issued only after the student clears all college dues. Such student shall, in no case be re-admitted during the same or the next academic session.
- The above rules are subject to change, modify or suspended as and when required.
- **The decision of the College Principal, in any matter, shall be final and binding.**

HOSTEL RULES

- ✓ Admission to the hostel is preferably given to students coming from far flung and backward areas, those belonging to SC/ST categories and backward classes, on the basis of merit.
- ✓ A hostel admission committee makes selection of the candidates, which includes a personal interview. Students desirous of seeking admission to the hostel must apply on the proper application form available with the Hostel Warden/College Office.
- ✓ Selected candidates shall have to pay the hostel dues in full before they report to the warden for allotment of rooms.
- ✓ No hosteller shall be allowed to remain in the hostel if his monthly dues are not paid within 15 days from the scheduled date unless specially authorized by the Principal.
- ✓ Resident students will be required to sign a receipt for items of furniture etc. issued to them. They will be responsible for any loss/damage to the hostel property. At the end of term, every student shall hand over the items issued to him.
- ✓ The common room secretary will be incharge of the various facilities available in the common room. No one is allowed to remove articles in the common room, without the permission of hostel warden.
- ✓ Meals are served in the dining hall only. A concession can, however, be made in the case of a broader, who is sick/physically challenged.
- ✓ The hostel mess is run by a contractor and managed by the mess committee comprising of students. Mess charges must be cleared by the 10th of each month, failing which the hosteller will have to pay a fine of Rs.2 per day up to the 15th of the month. After that, the hosteller will not be served any meals unless allowed by the warden.
- ✓ Mess charges for the initial three month are to be deposited in advance.
- ✓ The hostel gate is opened at 5 a.m. in summer and 6 a.m. in winter and is closed at 10 p.m in summer and 9 p.m. in winter. Gate shall not be opened during night except in case of emergency. No boarder shall be allowed to move out after the attendance is taken at night.

- ✓ Application for leave should be submitted to warden in person. Boarders who are absent without prior permission are liable to be expelled from the hostel. Any boarder staying away for the whole night without permission shall be fined Rs. 50 for the first offence.
- ✓ No guest or relative is allowed to reside in the hostel premises. Visitors are allowed in the visitor's lounge and not the hostel rooms.
- ✓ The hostellers are responsible for the safety of their own belongings. During vacation and when on long leave they shall remove all personal property from the premises of the hostel. The hostel authorities shall not be responsible for the loss or theft of any cash or valuables kept in the rooms of the boarders.
- ✓ Religious and political meetings/gatherings/functions are not allowed inside the hostel premises.
- ✓ Religious and political meetings/gatherings/functions are not allowed inside the hostel premises.
- ✓ Ragging in any form on or off the college campus including the hostel is cognizable offence and the students involved in ragging will be severely punished. Ragging in the hostel is strictly prohibited. Any student of the hostel indulging in ragging is liable to be expelled from the hostel and even from the college.
- ✓ If a hosteller is asked to vacate the hostel room on disciplinary or administrative grounds, he shall have to do so immediately, failing which the warden shall break open the lock of the room and remove the belongings.
- ✓ Hostel security shall be released only after all due payments have been made by a boarder. The claim for all such refunds should be made within one year from the date of leaving the hostel.
- ✓ The college authorities reserve the right to alter, amend or modify any of the existing rules without prior notice. Decision of the principal in all such matters shall be final and binding.

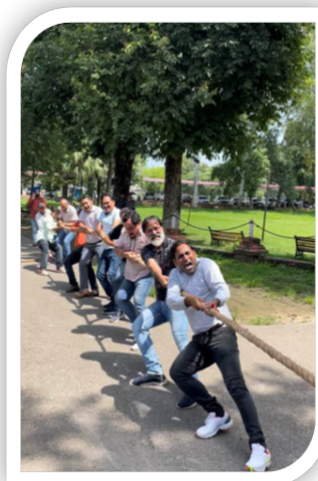
PHYSICAL EDUCATION AND SPORTS

The academic atmosphere in the college attempts to nurture a healthy mind in the students and the endeavour of the Physical Education Department is to give them a healthy body. This Department is housed in the Arts Block and is responsible for sports activities and maintenance of the playing fields. The department is manned by a well qualified staff. The activities of the Department are chalked out by the College Sports Board. The College owns an impressive sports infrastructure. Students, both resident as well non-resident, have the facilities of a cricket ground with a properly laid turf, hockey and football fields, besides an indoor hall and a number of other courts for basket ball, volleyball, tennis, badminton etc. Students are encouraged to participate in games at College as well as University level and the selected students play in national events also. After the completion of the admission process, College teams are announced on the basis of a rigorous selection process. The sportsmen are provided all necessary facilities like equipment, uniform, traveling allowance and refreshment for training as well as during the conduct of the tournaments. Deserving high achievers are considered for the award of College Colours every year, on the basis of overall performance of the players in and outside the sports fields. Players are expected to be disciplined and highly punctual.

The College has a splendid playground for Cricket, Football, Hockey, Tennis, Volley-ball, Kabaddi and Badminton. GGM Science College is renowned for producing winners in sports. Games are played regularly and every student is expected to play at least one game. Students can have the usual equipment for the games he/she opts for.

- After the completion of the admission process, the College teams are announced on the basis of trials and selection process. The players in their own interest are advised to be punctual and regular in their class work as well.
- Inter-group tournaments in all the games are conducted periodically. Mementoes and prizes are given to the winning groups.
- Extraordinary players are considered for awards which cannot be claimed as a matter of right but are decided by the competent authority on the basis of overall performance of the players in and outside the field.
- Special arrangements have been made for indoor games in which the members of the staff as well as students can participate.
- Table tennis can be played in multipurpose halls.
- Members of various teams must report punctually for practice and for matches. Absentees will be fined. There will be a special fine for absence from the matches. Any player who indulges in any kind of indiscipline in the College shall not be eligible for any prize, certificate or college colors.
- Students are required to take care of the games items they use.

COLLEGE LIBRARY

Housed in an independent block, the college library is one of the oldest libraries in J&K Higher Education Institutions. It has a rich and rare collection of books, some even dating back to the year 1868. A rare photo collection of the visit of the Royal Highness, the Prince and Princess of Wales, dating back to December 1905 is a pride possession of the college library. The college library has a collection of over 75,000 books pertaining to the varied range of subjects being offered in the college. The library facilities are upgraded every year in terms of making available latest titles on all subjects taught in the college. Several magazines, newspapers and journals relating to topics of general nature and specialized fields of science are subscribed in the college library for the benefits of students and staff. There is a separate reference section, heritage section, DST section etc. Day to day functioning of the library is taken care by qualified library staff. There is a reading hall in College library and separate reading room is also functional in the Electronics block, adjacent to the library. The College has subscribed college component of e-shodhsindhu consortium with access to over 6000+ electronic journals as well as 1,99,500+ electronic books under N-LIST. All students and faculty of the College are registered users of N-LIST.

The Library of the College is partially automated, using KOHA (Integrated library management system). With the help of automation, library operations are performed more efficiently. This includes tracking and managing of library collections, automating the check out and return of books and using digital tools to catalog and search library holdings. Bar- Code enabled library-cum-identity cards are issued to college students and faculty. Library offers free WIFI facility to all the students & faculty. Also there is an E-resources access zone in the library.

LIBRARY RULES

- ✓ The Library presently observes the same working hours and holidays as the College.
- ✓ Every student at the time of borrowing books from the Library shall produce his/her Identity Card. A person borrowing books from the Library shall be held responsible for any loss of pages or damage of the book and he/she will have to pay fine in addition to double the cost of that book.
- ✓ Teachers are not allowed to take more than ten books at a time.
- ✓ Members of the College staff or the establishment at the time of leaving the College or transfer, retirement or otherwise shall return all the books borrowed by them before the LPC or “No Demand” certificate is issued in his favour.
- ✓ Students can borrow only two books at a time, for a period of fifteen days.
- ✓ Students must return books taken by them within fifteen days. Any student retaining a book after the time allowed shall have to pay a fine of Rs. 1/- per day until the same is returned, provided the fine incurred shall not exceed double the cost of the book..
- ✓ Any person, who either loses a book or otherwise damages it, shall be liable to pay an amount not less than double the cost of the book. When it belongs to a set or series, and unless he can replace it, he shall be liable to pay the cost of the whole set or series.
- ✓ Students free from lecture work may visit the Library during the college hours. No talking or disturbance of any kind is allowed in the library. Any infringement of rules shall incur punishment/fine.
- ✓ Library is meant only for the use of those persons who are directly or indirectly connected with the academic life of the College.
- ✓ Books of the following description shall not be issued by the library: Reference Books Periodicals/Magazines Dictionaries of prominence Encyclopaedia/Census Reports, Rare books identified by College Library Committee/Principal.
- ✓ Periodicals shall not be issued except for consultation in the library premises.
- ✓ All books shall have to be returned to the library every year at the time of stock checking especially in April-May. The librarian shall make a report of books found damaged/missing to the principal, soon after the stock checking is over and shall prepare the list of books to be written off.
- ✓ Teachers of the College, who wish to retain certain books during the summer vacation, shall have to return the same to the library at the time of stock checking.
- ✓ Sleeping, smoking, chatting, eating etc are strictly prohibited in the library.

NATIONAL CADET CORPS

The National Cadet Corps (NCC) is a voluntary organization which is administered through the Ministry of Defence. The Defence Minister is overall in charge, and responsible to the Government of India for efficient functioning of the NCC and other matters. The NCC Headquarters is situated in New Delhi, headed by an officer of the rank of Lieutenant General who is responsible for the smooth functioning of the NCC in the country. National Cadet Corps came into existence on 16th April, 1948 and aims at developing the quality of character, courage, comradeship, discipline spirit of adventure and sportsmanship and ideals of selfless service and secular outlook among the youth and thus make them responsible citizens.

NCC cadets have been contributing towards strengthening forces of national unity, equality and secularism. This is an ever-on-going process and the organization remains committed to strive for its very best in this noble endeavor. The NCC is projected as the largest disciplined, uniformed youth organization in the world, has blossomed into a truly All India Corps, covering almost all the districts in our country, including the Andaman & Nicobar and Lakshadweep groups of islands. Its motto is **‘unity and discipline’**.

In J&K NCC activities were started in 1954 and a full-fledged NCC directorate was established in 1960 at Srinagar. The NCC wing in the college came into existence in 1968-69, which has grown over the years into three wings of about 270 cadets. A girl’s wing of NCC started opening from the 2002-03 session in the college.

NCC aims at creating a human resource of organized, trained and motivated youth to provide leadership in all walks of life including the Armed Force. NCC ‘C’ certificate holders are exempted from the written test of CDS/Indian Military Academy. The certificate holders are provided a host of other incentives also. The following wings of NCC operate in the college under the charge of qualified officers. These officers are members of the teaching faculty.

Every volunteer who joins NCC in the college as a cadet is imparted training consisting of regular parades, training in the handling of light weapons and other activities of related nature. NCC has a programme of

extension activities consisting of tree plantation, literacy drive; vigilance, awareness, civil defence, population education, participation in health and family welfare programmes and above all our NCC cadets are ever ready to donate blood on all occasions.

Many of our NCC cadets have qualified in various examinations related to NCC and thus qualified for entry into armed forces. Our well-trained cadets are regular participants in the Republic day parades and youth exchange programmes and other NCC camps/programmes.

Training Activities

Institutional Training - Institutional Training is the most important aspect of NCC training and hence great emphasis on institutional training is given in every training year.

Camp Training - A number of Annual Training Camps/Combined Training Camps being conducted locally every year and approximately all cadets have to attend the same for their Certificate exams. Different other camps like Ek Bharat Shreshtha Bharat (EBSB), Special National Integration (SNIC) Camps are also being conducted in Leh, Srinagar and other states for the awareness of national integration to the cadets from different states. Cadets of NCC Dte JK & L are being clubbed with cadets of different directorates to give opportunity to cadets of JK&L and other Directorates to know each other's culture, language and cuisine. Various other camps like Naval Sainik Camps (NSC), Adventure and Skill Development like Hot Air Balloon Trg. Mountaineering, Para Sailing Training, Thal Sainik Camp, and Republic Day Camp are also being conducted by DG NCC, Delhi. Every volunteer who joins NCC in the college as a cadet is imparted training consisting of regular parades, training in the handling of light weapons and other activities of related nature. Many of our NCC cadets have qualified in various examinations related to NCC and thus qualified for entry into armed and other defense forces. Our well-trained cadets are regular participants in the Republic day parades and youth exchange programs and other NCC camps/programs.

NCC Rules and Regulation

- ✓ Every enrolled NCC cadet has to undergo two parades of two hours each in a week and is required to attend 40 parades in a year.
- ✓ All cadets shall have to put in 75% attendance in the parades so as to become eligible for certificate examinations.
- ✓ Enrolled cadets have also to attend one camp.
- ✓ The uniform issued to the cadets is to be used with great care.
- ✓ The uniforms are to be returned at the end of the academic session to the officers concerned, failing which the permission will not be accorded to sit for the university examination. However, 3rd year cadets shall be allowed to keep some of the items with them, notification for which shall be issued by the concerned Associate NCC
- ✓ B and C certificate examinations are held annually for cadets in 2nd and 3rd year of NCC training respectively.
- ✓ Misbehaviour and misconduct in NCC activities, as adjudged by Associate NCC officers, can debar the cadet from any further NCC participation. In addition, disciplinary action under rules will be initiated by the college authorities, to the extent of expulsion from the college.
- ✓ Enrolled cadets are covered by insurance against any mishap during the training.
- ✓ Enrolment to the first year of training in NCC commences with the start of admission process for B.Sc Part I classes itself. Enrolment forms obtainable from the concerned Associate NCC officers, should be submitted at the time of deposition of fee. The newly selected cadets will, as a consequence, get an opportunity to attend NC camps organized in the month of July and August.

NATIONAL SERVICE SCHEME

Education through Service' is the purpose of the National Service Scheme (NSS) which aims at developing the personality and character of the student youth through voluntary community service. The ideological orientation of the NSS is inspired by the ideals of Mahatma Gandhi "**NOT ME, BUT YOU**" the motto of NSS says NSS volunteer places the '**community**' before '**self**'. There are two NSS units working under the guidance of NSS Programme Officers, each with a strength of 100 volunteers in the college. NSS volunteers are expected to put in 120 hours of social/community work during each academic session and also to attend a minimum one camp. Enrolment for NSS volunteers is carried at the start of the academic session. NSS units work and outreach the community for various awareness programs, in identifying the needs and problems of the community and involve themselves in problem-solving exercise; hence developing among themselves a sense of social and civic responsibility; gaining the skills in mobilizing community participation, acquiring leadership qualities and democratic values; developing capacity to meet emergencies and natural disasters; and practicing national integration and social harmony. NSS attempts to establish meaningful linkages between 'Campus and Community', 'College and Village' and 'Knowledge and Action'.

SCHOLARSHIP AND FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE

In order to provide ample and equal opportunities to students with low means of sustenance, there is a provision of scholarships for Scheduled Castes, Scheduled Tribes, Low Income groups, Other Social Castes, RBA, Frontier and Handicapped students. National Loan Scholarships and National Scholarships are awarded by the Government of India. Besides these, merit scholarships are also awarded to the deserving students. These scholarships are financed by the Govt. of India through the UT Govt. and are disbursed as per guidelines of Ministry of Social Justice & Empowerment, Govt. of India. In addition to this, college also grants financial assistance to poor and needy students out of Student Aid Fund . Disbursement of this assistance is made as per guidelines laid down by Higher Education Department. Orphan students with no earnings, children with broken families with no income support and physically challenged students are also considered for assistance from student aid fund .

The following documents are required to be submitted by the applicants:

- Certificate of income and occupation of the parent/guardian from a competent authority.
- The income certificate may be issued and certified, by a revenue officer not less than the rank of a Tehsildar.
- Attested copy of the state subject/Domicile certificate.
- Certificate of being differently abled /family composition, if applicable.

Students from distant places are advised to bring the above documents in advance at the time of admission so that their applications can be processed in time. Rules and Regulations for Scholarships/Financial Aid

Rules and Regulations for Scholarships/Financial Aid :

- A scholarship holder is expected to maintain regular attendance and a satisfactory conduct in the college.
- Scholarships shall be drawn only for the academic session including the month in which the University examinations are completed.
- Detained or failed students are not eligible for scholarship/financial aid, except in very exceptional circumstances.
- Parent/guardian of scholarship holder shall give an undertaking for refund of scholarship amount in one installment in case their ward is found to participate in strikes or any other subversive activities.
- All payments to the scholarship holder will be made directly into the A/C through DBT.
- Students desirous of availing scholarships/students aid are further advised to contact college scholarships committee for guidance and details regarding these schemes.

The grant and continuance of the scholarships is subject to the following conditions:

- Regular attendance
- Satisfactory conduct
- Production of Income Certificate
- Attested copy of the State Subject Certificate.

Browsing center with 20 networked computers with proper sitting isolation cabins, high speed Wifi internet and other ITC facility for project works and individual/group presentations are available.

2. Research Lab

GGM Science College recently established two Research centers in Physical Sciences and Computers, IT and Electronics under the Hub-Spoke model of Department of Higher Education vide Govt. Order No. 04 of JK (HE) dated 09.09.2020. The research centers are being equipped with state-of-the-art research equipment and facility. The prime aim of these research centers is to inculcate the research environment in college and to expose the UG/PG students of Hub/Spoke Colleges to research by involving them into research related works.

3. Psychological Counseling Cell

The role of the counseling cell is to bring about positive behavioral changes in the students and improve their ability to make their own decisions, understand their true potential and cope effectively with everyday problems they face. The Psychological Counseling Committee comprise of teaching faculty of the college. The committee identifies students who require services on priority along with their areas of deficiency and suggests the improvement required. The students once identified, are given academic as well as personal counseling.

4. Hostel

The college hostel caters to the need of 195 students and provides all the necessary facilities. The hostel has a adequately staffed and modernized kitchen with a spacious dining hall. There is a common room for hostel inmates providing all the necessary recreational facilities like TV, newspapers and magazines etc. Facilities for indoor game are also available. The hostel works under the supervision of a resident hostel warden.

5. Heritage Museum

a. Zoology Museum: There is also Zoology museum in the college which serves as an aid in teaching the students at graduate and post graduate level. It is also a valuable source for research students too. The museum has a good collection of both Non-chordate as well as Chordate animal specimens, stuffed birds, clay models of few animals, clay models depicting evolution of Horse and elephant, clay models of brain, heart, ear; bone Skelton and shells of human, fowl, rabbit, frog, turtle, preserved specimens of beaks and claws of birds. The museum enriches students, academicians, research scholars and other enthusiasts by providing information on evolution, conservation as well as diversity of animal life.

b. Wadia Museum: Museum of the Department, named after its founder as Dr. D.N. Wadia Museum of Geology, is one of the finest and second oldest museum of Geology in India. The museum houses rare specimens of minerals, rocks and fossils from state, rest of the country and abroad. The museum has different sections, viz. radioactive minerals section, mineral section, rocks section, fossils section, precious and semi-precious minerals section, antique section and sea life section. One of the longest fossilized tusk of *Stegodon ganesa* (Wadia 1924), a relative of ancestors of elephants is exhibited in the museum.

6. Gym

The College seated in-house gym facility for staff and students. Air condition rooms equipped with state-of-the-art excersing facility is created for all. The College edeavour to produces one of students not only with sharp brain with all round knowledge but also with fittest physical strength. The College facilty organises regular gym and Yoga classes with experts from different instites and organizations. The College edeavour to continuosly upgrade this facility for better working experiences of its staff and students.

7. Conference Room/Girls Common Room

Conference Room with a seating capacity of 140, high speed Wifi internet and smart board for project works and individual/group presentations are available. Moreover, the infrastructure with attached pantry and wash room is utilized for Girls Room.

8. Anti Ragging Committee

"Ragging" means committing any act which causes or is likely to cause any physical, psychological or physiological harm or apprehension or shame or embarrassment to a student and includes-

- (a) teasing or abusing or playing practical joke on, or causing hurt to any student.
or
- (b) asking any student to do any act, or perform anything, which he/she would not, in the ordinary course, be willing to do or perform.

Penalty for Ragging:

- (a) Expulsion from the educational institution, if found guilty on enquiry by the college against a complaint lodged by any other student.
- (b) Imprisonment of either description upto two years or fine upto five thousand rupees or both.
- (c) Any student convicted shall be dismissed from college and shall not be re-admitted.

9. Career Counseling and Guidance Cell

Students are provided information regarding various career options and counseled to choose subjects as per their aptitude and possible job avenues. The cell approaches reputed private companies / firms to hold placement drives for the outgoing students of the College. Besides this, lectures by eminent people are arranged to create awareness about the job opportunities and prospectus of higher education available.

10. Women's Studies Centre

Women's Studies Centre, G. G. M Science College was sanctioned by UGC in June 2006 with a vision of empowering women through humanizing and liberating process.

This centre intends to serve and benefit the student community as well as the faculty to provide services and support for women empowerment. It also aims at elimination of global gender disparities using power of science mixed with innovative thinking and experience.

The entire team of centre for Women's Studies and the volunteer faculty members working relentlessly apart from their routine duties and their efforts go a long way in moulding young mind towards the creation of a healthy society.

11. Insurance

All students admitted to the college shall be covered by a group insurance policy of RS 100.000. with a premium of RS.50 (subject to change) under personal accident scheme. Students admitted after the initial admission process in June/ July shall be covered under the policy for the remaining period and not for complete one year. In the event of an unfortunate accident the insurance company has to be intimated within a weeks time by the parents/ guardian of the student through the principal of the institution. However, the College authorities shall in no way be responsible for admission/ rejection of the claim by the insurance company. Under the policy, death/ loss of two limbs/ two eyes or one eye and one limb shall entail full payment of the sum insured. Loss of one limb or one eye covers 50% of the sum insured. The policy also covers expenses under temporary disability (PTD). Details about the personal accident cover can be obtained directly form the Insurance Company.

12. Parking

In order to ensure proper parking of vehicles, ample parking facilities are provided for students and staff separately. Limited covered parking is available for the staff. Safety of the parked vehicles is ensured by the class -iv staff duty in the area during the college hours.

13. Canteen

Two canteens and one juice corner are functional in the college premises for the use of students and staff. The facility is being further upgraded.

14. Medical facility

To ensure the availability of basic medical facility for the students, a small dispensary is functioning under the supervision of an experienced pharmacist. This dispensary maintains necessarily stock of medicines and other related items for first aid.

15. Bank: J&K Bank (Extension Counter)

Our college has an on-campus J&K Bank counter. This facility offers a range of banking services, including account management, cash withdrawals, deposits, and other financial transactions. The presence of the J&K Bank counter provides convenience to students, faculty, and staff, allowing them to manage their banking needs without leaving the campus. This addition ensures that our college community has easy access to essential banking services right at their doorstep.

16. Guest House

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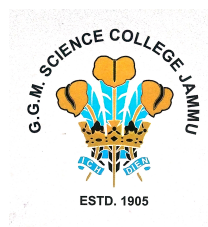
